MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL

LOCAL GOVERNMENT RE-ORGANISATION IN OXFORDSHIRE

Central Government is undertaking consultation and seeking views on the proposals submitted by councils for the re-organisation of local government in Oxfordshire. There are three main proposals:

- A single county unitary proposal for Oxfordshire developed and supported by Oxfordshire County Council: www.oxfordshire.gov.uk/oneoxfordshire
- A two-unitary proposal for Oxfordshire and West Berkshire developed and supported by Cherwell, South Oxfordshire, Vale of White Horse, West Berkshire and West Oxfordshire councils: www.twocouncils.org
- The three-unitary proposal for Oxfordshire and West Berkshire developed and supported by Oxford City Council: www.oxford.gov.uk/three-councils

HOWARD CORNISH ROAD - SALVATION ARMY TEXTILE BANK

Residents will have noticed that the textile bank has now been removed by Salvation Army Trading. This has been removed owing to a review in operational changes. The Salvation Army has said, "Unfortunately the second-hand textile sector has sustained a prolonged downturn over the past 24 months with no indication that this will reverse in the near future. This decline has been driven by global economic uncertainty and rising operational costs. At the same time, the growing influx of low-quality garments from ultra-fast fashion companies and significant volumes of non-rewearable textiles has increased waste and processing costs, while recycling markets for these materials remain extremely limited".

MORLAND ROAD – FOOTWAY

As previously reported in Marcham and District News, one of the issues being investigated locally, is the relocation of the Morland Road footway at the point of entry into Barrow Close. Pedestrians crossing the entrance could not be seen by vehicles leaving the hall site, and safety needed to be prioritised. Oxfordshire County Council manages the highway, and when asked for an update at the end of last year, indicated that they were in the process of preparing some drawings. However, owing to pricing deadlines for road schemes to be achieved this financial year, the County Council had to rapidly progress the matter, so unfortunately there has been no chance to view and comment on the design proposals. At the

February meeting of the Parish Council, the Council learned that the work was imminent. The new path will be monitored closely and suggestions for further improvements put forward if required.

THAMES WATER RESERVOIR – SESRO

The consultation has closed and Thames Water are reading and digesting all the responses received. The replies will feed into and inform the Development Consent Order application which will be lodged with Government. The Parish Council wishes to be kept informed as the project progresses and is sending representatives to a briefing for councillors on 5th March. Any new information given can be shared with residents

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

This meeting is not a Council meeting, but is a gathering of electors in the parish. This is your opportunity to engage with your local councillors, not only the Parish Councillors, but the District Councillor and County Councillor too, as well as hearing what is happening in the area. The date set for the meeting is Thursday 14th May at 7.30 p.m. in Marcham Centre. Put a note of the date in your calendar now.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

The Council considered amendments to applications P25/V2571/HH and P25/V2732/LB for the erection of a single storey part oak framed flat roof extension with roof-lights at 3 Mill Road. As per the previous main application, it raised no objections to the proposal.

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Marcham Parish Council – How We Work & What's Planned for 2026

Marcham Parish Council is made up of 10 councillors, meeting regularly at the Village Hall in Barrow Close to discuss local issues, projects and priorities. Our work ranges from improving village amenities to representing residents in discussions with the Vale of White Horse District Council (VoWHDC) and Oxfordshire County Council (OCC). Our committees and working groups help us focus on specific topics such as footpaths, allotments, and environmental matters.

How We Are Funded

Most of the Council's income comes from the parish precept—the portion of council tax paid by households in Marcham. Additional income comes from cemetery fees, allotment rentals, grants, interest, and developer contributions (S106 and Community Infrastructure Levy). This funding allows us to maintain village assets such as the Village Green, Play Area, Arboretum and open spaces.

What is the Precept?

It is a local tax used to provide services such as cemeteries, playing fields, open spaces, street furniture and more. Parish councils do not receive funding from central government, so the precept is essential to maintaining village amenities.

Community Grants

The Parish Council sets aside funds annually to support local groups benefitting residents, with applications usually reviewed in November.

What We Achieved Last Year

Grass Cutting & Village Appearance

Following concerns raised by residents about visibility at junctions and general village maintenance, the Parish Council decided to opt out of the district-wide grass cutting scheme. This gives us full control over scheduling and standards.

Footpath Improvements

We worked with the Green Working Party to progress improvements to the Arboretum path and wider village links, with further work expected as S106 funds are released.

Anson Field Play Area Upgrade

Major upgrades were completed at the Anson Field play area, adding new equipment for all ages, seating, picnic tables and safety surfacing. Final signage and repainting work is planned for later 2026.

Barrow Close Safety Measures

Working with partners, a second speed bump was installed near the community centre, and discussions continue on rerouting the footpath to further improve safety.

Allotment Improvements

Cow Lane saw new fencing, gate works and tree maintenance. Parkside allotments were cleared to create additional growing space.

Village Assets & Repairs

Recent work includes repairs to benches, planning for a new noticeboard, tree maintenance and improvements to the War Memorial.

Plans for 2026

- Allotment improvements
- Footpath upgrades
- Entrance safety at the village hall
- Recreation ground wall repairs
- War memorial enhancements and artwork
- Bus shelter improvements
- Speed indicator devices
- Lighting upgrades along Harding Way
- Link paths between new housing estates

To achieve this, however, we need additional persons to be involved to help to complete these projects.

Get Involved

Working parties welcome new volunteers. If you're interested in joining a working party or the council, or simply want to know more about getting involved, please contact the Parish Clerk at clerk@marchamparishcouncil.gov.uk.

If you are passionate about your local community, we need you. Councillors make a huge difference to the quality of life of local people and how local issues are dealt with. Councils need people from all backgrounds and experiences to reflect the communities they represent. There are also multiple, and varied, opportunities to volunteer for specific groups that match your interests with how you can help the wider community without needing to become a Councillor. We are particularly interested in people who are able to contribute to identifying the core identity of the Parish and how this can be taken forward in a local Neighbourhood Plan. If you wish to see how you can contribute, develop your skills and add to your CV while helping your community contact the Parish Clerk, who can illustrate the options available.

RAF Abingdon was established as an airfield in 1932, serving as headquarters and the base for two bomber squadrons until the onset of World War II in 1939. Following the war, the airfield transitioned to Transport Command, operating aircraft such as the Dakota, York, Hastings, Beverley, and Andover.

Growing up near RAF Greenham Common sparked Alan's interest in aviation. In 1968, he moved to Abingdon

and witnessed RAF Abingdon's final days as a Transport Command hub.

From then until the airfield's closure in July 1992, he was captivated by its history and stories. His fascination continues today and he helps as a volunteer at the Abingdon Air & Country Show held each year on what remains of the airfield.

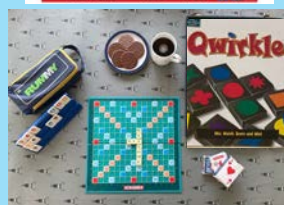

Besides the food miles, there are other reasons to go local. Local produce is often better quality, more nutritious and for meat and milk, produced under higher welfare conditions. Vegetables are often grown with environmentally sensitive methods because by cutting out aggressive supply chains, growers can invest more in growing their vegetables. Buying local means eating in season when the produce tastes best. It is certainly an investment in your community and local economy.

Strangely enough there is no officially agreed-upon distance for what constitutes eating locally. Did you know that 'local produce' can come from as far as 50 miles away?

Art Deco has the reputation of being the most glamorous and popular style of the 20th century which was prevalent during the 1920s and 1930s. We will review the development of the style within the context of its social and economic environment and look at specific examples of objets d'arts, including silver, jewellery, furniture, ceramics, clocks and architecture.

A new exhibition

21 March - 30 April 2026

The military heritage of Oxfordshire stretches back nearly 2000 years. This long heritage is evident in the sweep from the earliest named soldier in Oxfordshire, Lucius Valerius Geminus, a veteran of the Second Augustan Legion who was buried at Alcester in 79AD to the siege of Oxford as the Royalist stronghold of Charles I in the English Civil Wars to the present day. Over the last 300 years the people and regiments of Oxfordshire have actively shaped Britain's most important conflicts from the American War of Independence and the Napoleonic Wars to the First and Second World Wars and beyond.

Two regiments are most associated with the county: The Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire Light Infantry (Oxf & Bucks LI) and The Queens Own Oxfordshire Hussars (QOOH) also known as the Oxfordshire Yeomanry. Over the course of their history they were deployed across the world in various capacities including the defence of Europe and the British Empire. Their involvement has often proved critical in the key military events of British history, be it the 52nd (Oxfordshire) Regiment of Foot charging the French Imperial Guard during the Battle of Waterloo or the 2nd Battalion of the Oxf & Bucks LI landing in gliders to secure exits from the Normandy beaches on D-Day.

This exhibition considers 50 objects selected from the 14,500 items preserved in the collection of the Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum to give a glimpse into the story of Oxfordshire's military heritage. These objects tell the stories of residents of the county and the soldiers of Oxfordshire's regiments who have been impacted by, and influenced, conflicts across the centuries.

MARCHAM PRIMARY SCHOOL NEWS

Although the weather has been wet and gloomy, learning and curricular opportunities have been in abundance this half term at Marcham Primary School.



Twelve of our Year 5 and 6 pupils took part in the **Music Flood Orchestra Day**. They had been practising hard to learn three pieces at school before assembling for one day with 300 other pupils to perform the pieces. Sectional rehearsals took place before the Silk Hall in Radley was filled with pupils from primary and secondary schools performing together. The experience was amazing and the sound was outstanding but as the pupils said "very loud".

Out on the field, some children took part in **Tag Rugby Competition**, developing teamwork skills, coordination and confidence. The sessions were full of energy and enthusiasm, with everyone enjoying the chance to get active and support one another. They worked well as a team and represented our school admirably. It was our first time at this type of competition so we had to learn as we went but the children thrived.



Reception, Year 1, Year 2 and Year 3 took part in **Singing Workshops from Radley College**, where simple songs and games were learnt. The children practised singing individually as well as in a group during the action games. Our key intention is to increase enthusiasm and the amount of singing within each classroom.

In addition to this, some children took part in a Dance Festival where they explored movement and rhythm, learning routines and expressing themselves through dance. Their hard work and excitement were clear for all to see and on return, they spoke animatedly about the experience.

Finally, our Year 4 class have taken part in a **Science Workshop at Abingdon School**, where hands-on activities and engaging demonstrations encouraged learning through exploration. They built simple electric circuits and learnt about current, voltage and resistance through practical activities and problem-solving challenges.

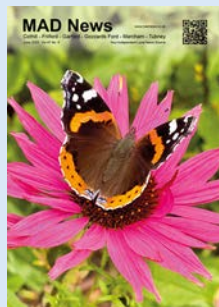
The judging will be done by public vote at the Big Weekend and the ones chosen will be contacted to provide a hi-resolution jpg/tiff of their image.

SPORT REPORT

FOOTBALL

Since last month football has been affected by the weather (again) and looking at the pitch outside the Centre it is difficult to imagine that this (mostly muddy) field will, in a couple of months or so, become once again a verdant sward with a look forward to the return of cricket which starts at the beginning of May, and runs through until September. Marcham 1st football team have played three games and had one walkover (a win for Marcham), winning two and losing one. They currently lie 3rd in the North Berks table, only one point behind the leaders, Drayton, but with two games in hand. The Marcham second team have played two games and drawn one lost one. The valiant Vets have lost both games but are not at the bottom of the table.

WINTER OLYMPICS AND PARALYMPICS

Italy is hosting the Winter Olympics and Paralympics in the north of the country where, unlike Marcham, they have hills and usually have snow and ice at this time of year. The first winter games were held in France in 1924 and have been held every four years since then, only interrupted by World War II. This year a total of 93 countries are taking part in 16 sports including a new event; ski mountaineering – clearly out of reach for Marcham, in fact anything downhill (or uphill) is out of the question for us.

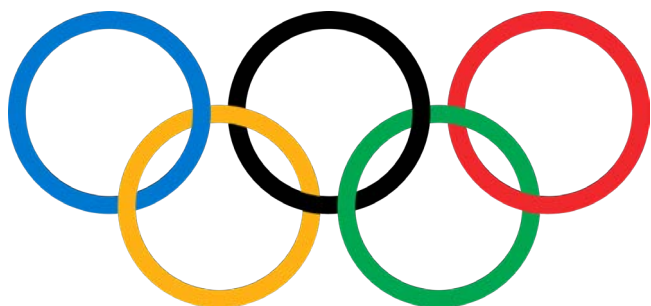
Great Britain has 53 competitors in all 16 sports. Each of the sports is scary in its own way, but for me the two scariest are the skeleton (head first) and the luge (feet first) where speeds of up to 90mph can be reached. These are undertaken as men's, women's and mixed which latter brings intimacy to a whole new level.

There has been controversy involving the British skeleton team's helmets that the International Bobsleigh and Skeleton Federation (IBSF) deemed breached the rules where the rear of the helmet 'significantly protrudes'. The Team lost an appeal to the Court of Arbitration for Sport (Cas). Hence they must wear the helmets that they have worn when winning all seven world cup races this year. Peevishly the IOC have also banned a Ukrainian from wearing a helmet showing pictures of Ukrainian athletes who are victims of the war.

Security at such events is always an issue. It is estimated that there are around 6,000 security personnel drawn from several countries. Already cyber-attacks have taken place, allegedly by Russia and Belarus who are banned from the games due to the invasion of Ukraine. Unbelievably the USA has sent ICE agents to the games to assist with security, difficult to envisage them having the authority to deport an individual from Italy. Hopefully they are a little less trigger happy than those posted to Minnesota.

The Paralympics started with British victims of spinal cord injuries after World War II competing at Stoke Mandeville in England in 1948. Four years later Holland joined in, and Paralympic contests were born. Winter Paralympics started in 1976 and has grown. This year in Italy there are 79 different medals across 6 disciplines with over 650 athletes competing from 52 countries (the number of medals reflects the degree of disability within each discipline). This year sees a new medal event - wheelchair curling mixed doubles. Currently the size of the Great Britain squad is undetermined. More on this next month.

At the time of writing (15th February) the games are still in progress, and the Paralympics have yet to start. Great Britain have, to date, won 2 gold medals. There is still over a week to go, and those figures may change.

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Oxfordshire Fire and Rescue Service – keeping Oxfordshire safe and well

Safe and well visits offer practical advice to older and vulnerable residents about the risks in their home that could lead to falls, fire, or any source of harm.

Firefighters or dedicated advisers will talk to residents about smoke and carbon monoxide alarms (or fit them) and about how they can keep themselves safe in the event of a fire.

They can also provide advice and signposting on alcohol use, staying well and warm, and scams and doorstep crime prevention.

If you work or support vulnerable people in their own homes, you can refer someone for a safe and well visit on the county council's website here:

If you have spotted any of the following, then consider a referral:

- There are no working smoke or carbon monoxide alarms
- The resident may find it difficult to react quickly in the event of a fire or emergency
- They are using electrical equipment with trailing leads, lots of extensions or possible unsafe wiring
- There are large amounts of post or other indications that the resident is being targeted directly by possible scams
- The resident has made comments that they have concerns about staying safe.

There's no cost for a safe and well visit. It's just practical advice and peace of mind.

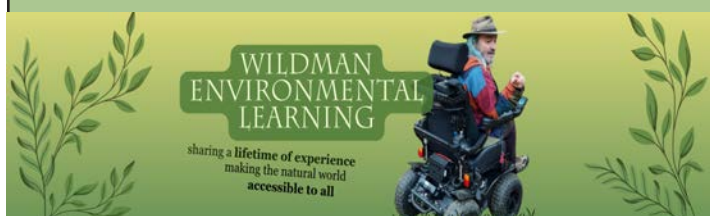
So yes, winter is miserable. But that first golden unfurling? Worth every shiver.

'Diggs, Sideline, Touchdown!' I can remember exactly where I was when I heard those three words, falling out of my chair in joyful disbelief at around 1:30am, as the Minnesota Vikings beat the New Orleans Saints in a playoff game in 2017. That may not mean much to you, but it meant a lot to me. Those three words can recall incredible emotion and excitement. It's amazing that so few words can have a profound effect on us. Think, 'I love you', or, 'it's a boy/girl'. In three words, so much can be communicated. Three words can change nations and echo through history: 'Veni, vidi, vici' (I came, I saw, I conquered), Britain Declares War, Russia Invades Ukraine. Few short statements, however memorable or emotive, can claim to change the whole world but there's a couple that might: 'It is finished' and 'He is risen'. DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

THE GOOD KIND OF FREEZING

As the weather warms up and gardeners worry less about frosts, I'm happy to report some more welcome "freezing" from the Vale and my cabinet portfolio, in particular. The first is on Car Park fees, where we have managed to keep fees unchanged for another year. This situation can't go on for ever, since we have a statutory duty to cover the costs of operating car parks and those costs are rising with inflation, but we're keen to do what we can to support both residents and town-centre businesses. There will be a change to Vale Car Parks, however: ticketless machines are being rolled out further, which will increase convenience for users and reduce printing costs (over 400,000 free-first-hour tickets were printed last year!). The second is on household bin collections: residents may be aware that many councils elsewhere are increasing the number of bins needed by each household, following DEFRA's guidance that introducing a separate bin for paper & card recycling will somehow make for "Simpler Recycling". We're sticking with our current approach of all Dry Mixed Recycling in the same bin, using the Vale's excellent track record on recycling as part of the justification.



GOVERNMENT CONSULTATIONS

Central government is currently consulting on a number of themes that may be of interest to residents, and I'd encourage you to respond to these if you'd like to make your views heard.

One theme is Local Government Reorganisation: as I've mentioned in previous reports, the current two-tier structure of councils is soon to be abolished, with district/city councils (including the Vale) and Oxfordshire County Council merged into a Unitary Authority... or Authorities, depending on the geography selected by central government. Search online for "Proposals for local government reorganisation in Oxfordshire" for details and on how to respond.

Another is on the growing problem of homeowners on new-build estates being trapped with a management company forced upon them, performing poorly and charging disproportionately high fees. This is often exacerbated by the difficulties of getting roads and other communal infrastructure adopted. Search online for "Enhanced protections for homeowners on freehold estates", or "Reducing the prevalence of private estate management arrangements" for details and on how to respond.

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COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

On 10th February, Oxfordshire County Council agreed its budget for 2026/27. Whilst the County Council continues to face financial pressures from national government, I was disappointed to see the administration approve yet another 4.99% increase in Council Tax for local residents. During the debate I supported an amendment which would've seen more investment in frontline services, headlined by an additional £1.3m per year for highways maintenance. This would have been particularly welcome given the poor state of local roads at present. This would have been funded through a series of small savings, including the removal of free lunches for councillors, and the use of a limited amount of reserves. Unfortunately, this amendment was rejected by the administration.



Turning to more local issues, last month I reported that I had raised the issue of flooding on the A415, west of Church Street junction through Marcham. I'm happy to report that a 28 day 'defect' was raised for the culvert to be cleared and jetted on 14th January, so by the time you read this, works should have been carried out that address some of the longstanding issues with flooding. I will monitor the effectiveness of the works that are carried out and push for further work if the issue isn't fully resolved.

By the time you read this, works should have also been completed on the re-diversion and installation of a new section of footpath on Morland Road, at the entrance to Barrow Close. The existing footpath, which cuts across the entrance to the Village Hall, will be removed entirely and the area will be reinstated as a verge, with topsoil and seed. Clearly, we will need to monitor how effective this proves to be, but my hope is that it provides a better line of sight for vehicles exiting Barrow Close and should address some of the safety concerns in the area.

Finally, the government recently launched its consultation on potential changes to local government in Oxfordshire, which will affect both how councils operate and how services are delivered in the future. There are three proposals being considered for Oxfordshire and I would urge residents to take part in the consultation, as these changes will have a lasting impact. **You can take part and share your views until Thursday 26th March** and full details of each proposal, along with information on how to respond, can be found online here: <https://consult.communities.gov.uk/local-government-reorganisation/oxfordshire/>

MP'S REPORT

SESRO RESERVOIR CONSULTATION

I recently submitted my response to Thames Water's consultation on the proposed South East Strategic Reservoir (SESRO). In doing so, I sought to reflect the many concerns raised by residents, community groups and local authorities across our area.

There remain serious unanswered questions about the scheme's safety, environmental impact and spiralling costs. The estimated price has risen dramatically in recent years, and Thames Water customers, who have already seen significant bill increases, are expected to shoulder the burden. I have called for a full review of the business case, including proper consideration of alternative options, before any final decision is made.

Flood risk remains one of the biggest concerns locally, particularly for South Abingdon. Detailed flood modelling and mitigation plans must be finalised and guaranteed before any development proceeds. There are also major questions about construction traffic, including hundreds of thousands of HGV movements, and whether the impact on local roads has been properly assessed.

If the reservoir is to go ahead, Thames Water must work far more closely with local communities and ensure that meaningful, fully costed community benefits are delivered. At present, many of the promised amenities appear aspirational rather than guaranteed.

I will continue to press Thames Water and ministers to provide clarity, transparency and proper safeguards for local residents as this process moves forward.

HOLDING THAMES WATER TO ACCOUNT

At the beginning of January, I called a Westminster Hall debate on the chronic mismanagement of Thames Water. I did so because far too many residents continue to experience flooding, sewage problems and spiralling bills, with little accountability and even less confidence that the company can put things right.

I have also raised these issues directly with the Prime Minister. Customers are being asked to pay more, despite years of underinvestment and infrastructure failures that Thames Water itself admits are widespread. If a company cannot be trusted to deliver the basics – sewage-free rivers, repaired leaks, and proper customer service – then serious reform is the only option.

I am continuing to press the Government to stop delaying action, and to ensure Thames Water is rebuilt as a public benefit company, with money reinvested into fixing leaks, preventing sewage spills, and restoring trust.



LOCAL GOVERNMENT FUNDING

Alongside other Oxfordshire MPs, I have written to the Government to oppose planned cuts to Oxfordshire County Council's funding. Central government is proposing to reduce the council's funding by £24.1 million over the next three years, at the same time as allowing council tax to rise by up to 4.99% a year. These pressures come on top of growing demand for services such as adult social care, SEND provision and road maintenance.

I am clear that this situation is not the result of local failure, but of national decisions that shift responsibility onto councils while removing the funding needed to deliver. I will continue working with councillors across the county to press the Government to reverse these cuts and put local government funding on a more sustainable footing.
